Chester goat owners hold judging clinic

KNAUERTON — Chester dairy goat enthusiasts assembled here at Peg Jacob's farm last Tuesday evening for a dairy goat judging clinic.

Approximately 25 people pitted their minds against that of Daniel Weinstock, the judge for the evening.

Two classes of goats, one Toggenburg, the other LaMancha, provided the bodies as young and not so young placed the animals and gave oral reasons for their placings.

Roy Malick, Chester County Dairy agent, said

this was the third in a series of judging clinics the goat enthusiasts have conducted this year. Initially, he said, they were aimed at 4-H youth, but parents came in greater number than the children, so it's been aimed at both groups recently. Malick said he expects to have another clinic this year.

The goat owners many of whom had never previously done any dairy judging, listened as Weinstock explained what they should be looking for and the scoring

system used in the official dairy goat score cards. The evening session was just one in a series of meetings Malick has set up to aid Chester goat owners.

Other meetings are planned for people in the county including those interested in backyard homestead goats and commercial producers. Any Chester County residents are invited to attend the meetings. For more information, call Malick at the Chester Extension office, 215/696-3500.

July milk

output rises

HARRISBURG — Milk production in Pennsylvania during the July 1980 totaled 707 million pounds, up three percent from a year earlier, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

The number of milk cows in the commonwealth during July was 707,000 head, up 11,000 head from a year ago.

Milk production per cow averaged 1000 pounds in July, up 15 pounds from a year ago.

United States milk production during July totaled 11.0 billion pounds, three percent above July 1979.

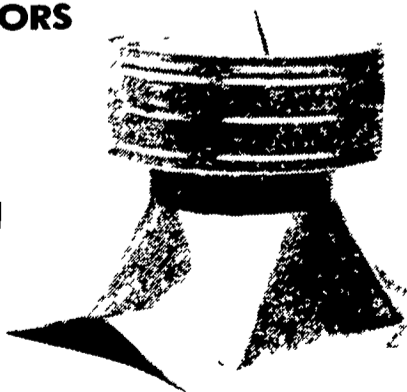
