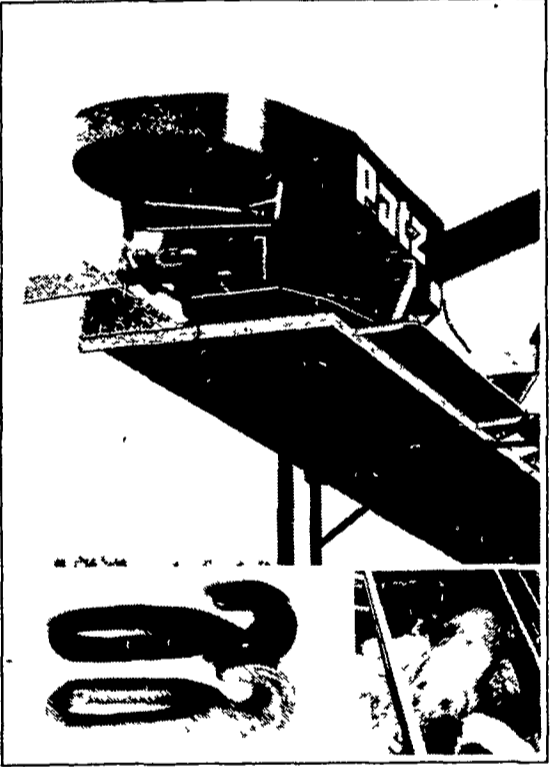

KEYSTONE, Co. — Nearly four hundred members of the American Simmental Association and their families participated in ASA's sixth annual Summer Conference held recently at Keystone Resort, 70 miles west of Denver.

"Our 1980 Summer Conference was our best ever in terms of productivity," said Executive Secretary Earl Peterson. "Members from 32 states and Canada, attended, and their eagerness to provide input during the working committee

meetings, contributed to its success."

Fifteen committees were convened, all chaired by a member of the ASA Trustees, and covered subject matter dealing with concepts, performance, the World Simmental Federation, breeder's guidelines, youth and education, Polled Simmental, convention agendas and several others.

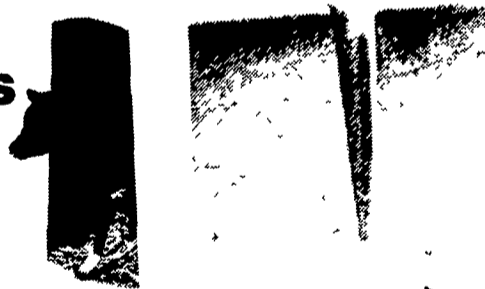
One decision which came out of the Summer Conference was the extension of ASA's cost-sharing advertising program, in which

ASA matches dollar-for-dollar, the advertising budgets of State Associations within guidelines established by the Trustees.

It was announced that the 1981 Summer Conference will be held July 15-19 at the Great Smokies Hilton Hotel located at Asheville, North Carolina. It will be the first Summer Conference held in the Southeastern United States. Orlando, Florida was approved as the site for the 14th ASA Annual Meeting and Convention, January 28-31, 1982.
