## Seasons set

**HARRISBURG** — Dates of the aggregate of the two hunting seasons and bag limits for doves, rails, gallinules, snipe and woodcock for 1980 have been established by the Pennsylvania Game Commission.

The framework for season and limits is set up by U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington following annual surveys of breeding populations. States then select dates for seasons within the federal framework.

Pennsylvania's waterfowl seasons will not be established until late August or early September. The Game Commission cannot set waterfowl season until after the federal government draws up its framework, which is not completed prior to late August at the very earliest.

For 1980, the Pennsylvania season of 69 half-days for doves will open on Monday, September 1, and will close on Saturday, November 8. The daily limit will again be 12, with a possession limit of 24 after the first day of the season.

This year the season on sora and Virginia rails and gallinules will again coincide with the dove season, opening September 1 and closing on November 8. There is no open season on king and clapper rails in Pennsylvania.

The daily bag and possession limit is 25 on sora and Virginia rails, singly or in

the aggregate of the two species. The daily limit on gallinules is 15, with not more than 30 in possession after the first day of the season.

In 1980 the woodcock season will open on Saturday, October 18 and continue through Saturday, December 20. This year's daily bag limit on woodchuck remains at five, with a possession limit of 10 after the first day.

The season for snipe also opens on Saturday, October 18, and will continue through Saturday, December 20. The daily bag limit on Wilson's or jacksnipe is eight, with a possession limit of 16.

Daily shooting hours for rails, gallinules, snipe and woodcock are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. The daily shooting hours for doves are from 12 o'clock noon until sunset.

A federal migratory bird hunting stamp (duck stamp) is not required to hunt doves, rails, gallinules, snipe or woodcock.

Hunters are reminded that bows and arrows and shotguns plugged to no more than a three-shell capacity are legal, but rifles and revolvers or pistols are prohibited for hunting migratory birds. Shot larger than BB size is prohibited for hunting migratory birds in Pennsylvania.

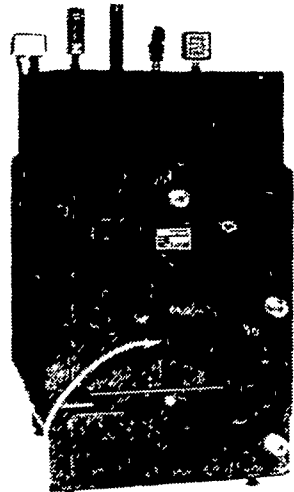

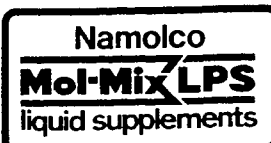
