Plan now for fall fertilization

LITITZ — Your 1981 soil fertilization program should

start now. Careful planning at this time can make the difference between a good or poor crop next year, reminds John Baylor, extension

agronomist at Penn State. Begin with a soil test. Determine the need for lime and fertilizer. Fall is the best time to apply lime. You can also apply some of the

needed fertilizer this fall. Baylor outlines the advantages for applying phosphorus and potasium

this fall. -Hay crops continue to "breathe" all winter. They may be in hibernation, but you can't let them die.

-Fall fertilized alfalfa and other legumes will suffer less winter injury than staved plants.

-Fall fertilized hay crops get off to an earlier and more vigorous start in the spring.

Time is money. You have more time to fertilize in the fall than during the busy spring period.


—Less soil compaction. The soil is generally more firm in the fall than in the spring.

However, there are some don'ts.

-Don't apply fertilizer on frozen ground, particularly on sloping land. Winter rains and melting snow can carry much of the fertilizer off the land.

-Normally, you should apply nitrogen in the spring rather than in the fall. Nitrogen is very mobile and can be lost by leaching or by run-off. Also, it can be lost as a gas during winter-logged periods.

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
