Vegetable-dairy farmer named campaign chairman

CLARKS SUMMIT -Keith Eckel, a Lackawanna County dairy, grain and vegetable farmer, has been named chairman of the Pennsylvania Farmers for Reagan-Bush Committee.

His appointment was announced by the Reagan-Bush State Chairman, Richard J. Fox.

Eckel, a member of the executive committee of the board of directors of the Pennsylvania Farmers Association and a member of the Pennsylvania State University agricultural advisory council, farms near Clarks Summit in partnership with his father, Fred W. Eckel, and his brother, Fred D. Eckel. They produce and pack mature green

tomatoes on 250 acres and have a herd of 150 Holstein dairy cattle.

Eckel said he has joined the Reagan-Bush effort because of the need to end government regulations of agriculture and other businesses.


