# Wheat, barley producers eligible for benefits

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Wheat and barley producers will continue to receive storage payments on their reserve grain, Ray Fitzgerald, executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation, said last Friday.

"Because the reserve release and call prices were substantially increased last month, due to the rapid increase in production costs, the release prices are above the price received by farmers for wheat and barley," Fitzgerald said.

"As a result, wheat and barley are no longer in continue to earn storage payments until a sufficient quantity has been placed in the farmer-owner reserve to move farm prices above release prices.'
