

Dorset breeders form association

HARRISBURG — Dorset breeders throughout Pennsylvania have flocked together to form a state-wide organization.

Legally organized on July 11, 1980, the group is known as the Pennsylvania Dorset Breeders Association — an appropriate title.

Listed as their first and primary objective is to support and sponsor a Bred Ewe Sale at the Keystone International Livestock Exposition. This young organization has made their goal a reality.

On Saturday, October 4, the First Dorset Bred Ewe Sale will begin at 6 p.m. at the Farm Show Complex in Harrisburg. This marks the first major function of the newly formed organization, and will become an annual.

Ann Staver, president of PDBA, explained that any citizen of the state who owns Dorset sheep is eligible to become a member of the

Association. Annual dues per family is \$5.

Out-of-state breeders wishing to become associate members of the Pennsylvania group can apply for membership with the recommendation of a member in good standing

Dues for associate, non-voting members are \$2.50 each year.

Wheat, barley producers eligible for benefits

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Wheat and barley producers will continue to receive storage payments on their reserve grain, Ray Fitzgerald, executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation, said last Friday.

"Because the reserve release and call prices were substantially increased last month, due to the rapid increase in production costs, the release prices are above the price received by farmers for wheat and barley," Fitzgerald said.

"As a result, wheat and barley are no longer in release status and will

continue to earn storage payments until a sufficient quantity has been placed in the farmer-owner reserve to move farm prices above release prices."

At the present time, storage payments are being made on wheat, barley and oats

Corn placed in reserve before August 25 continues in release status but storage payments have been stopped locally.

Corn and sorghum placed in reserve since August 25 also remains in release status, but storage payments are continuing in all states, at least through the end of

September, Fitzgerald said.

Data used by CCC in determining the release and call levels include the five-day average prices as reported by the U.S.

Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service showing prices bid by buyers at selected regional markets. The month-end report of prices

received by farmers issued by USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperatives Service is also used to determine if the release or call authorizations should be withdrawn

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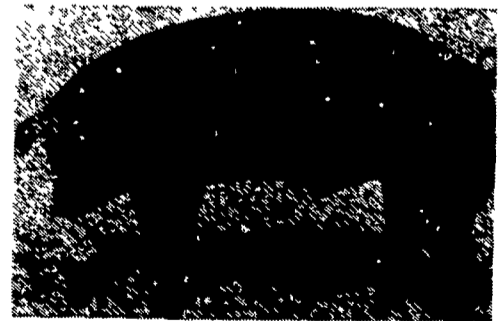
