program, Patricia said: "4-H has helped me to decide on a career. It also assisted me in developing leadership skills and patience and cooperation when working with others."

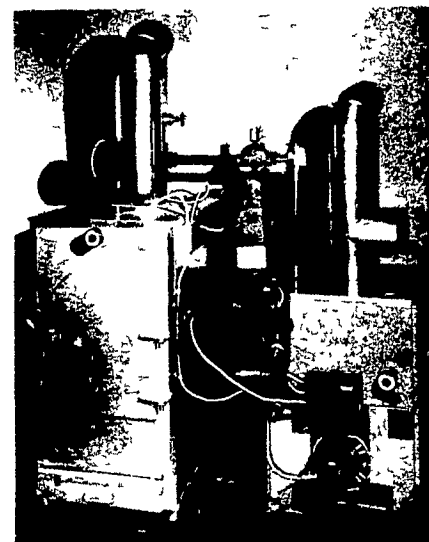
She is one of 41 Commonwealth 4-H members being selected as state contest winners in the various project categories.

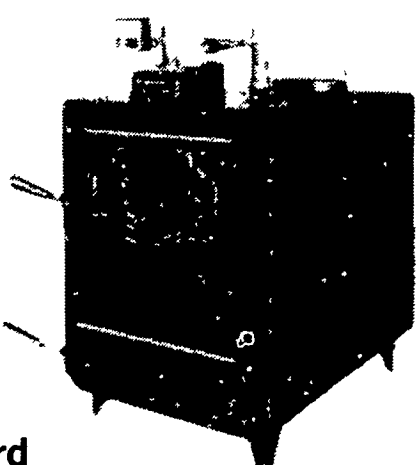
