

## Alfalfa production to be forage conference feature

HERSHEY - Alfalfa research in the 1980's and challenges in seed production will be topics discussed during the 1980 Conference Forage scheduled for November 24 and 25 at the Hershey Convention Center, Hershey. Registration will be held from 9 a.m. to noon on November 24 at the Con-

vention Center, points out John E. Baylor, extension agronomist at Penn State. The program will conclude at 4 p.m. on November 25.

The Monday afternoon program will center on the theme, "Alfalfa, Queen of the Forages."

Speakers include A.A. Hanson, director of research for Waterman-Louomis Co., who will discuss "Alfalfa-Challenges in the 1980's"; Audy S. Bell, manager of J.H. Boswell Co. in California, presenting "Alfalfa-Challenges in Seed Production"; and R.R. Hill, Jr. research agronomist at the Penn State U.S. Regional Pasture Laboratory, speaking on "Alfalfa Research in the Decade Ahead."
