mean less productivity, higher food prices, and a myriad of other problems.

There's no question that America has developed the best agricultural system in the world. Our abilities combined with our political and economic systems and our natural advantages make American agriculture the dream of most other countries.

If you look at other industries in this country, it's not too hard to figure out that farming is about the only thing we do better than most of our foreign competitors. So why mess it up under the guise of saving some jobs for some farm workers?

The fact is that farm mechanization creates more

jobs in industry, which has allowed the displaced workers to find new and usually better employment. It would be foolish to stop now in our quest for better planting and harvesting techniques, more efficient farm power, and improved materials handling systems.

Agricultural history is cluttered with mechanization milestones, going back as far as the invention of the horse collar and including the moldboard plow, the cotton gin, the grain reaper, the tractor, the corn picker, and the combine.

If properly encouraged and supported, agricultural research will continue to find new and better ways to solve

farm mechanization problems. Admittedly, those inventions will displace some more farm labor.

As one who has labored in the fields doing the hand jobs for which there were no machines, I'm all for mechanization research in whatever form. The sooner it comes and the better it works, the happier I'll be.

I don't want to go back to milking cows by hand, shocking wheat and pitching manure.

Nor do I want to condemn future generations of farm folk to some of the awkward and wasteful techniques of today.

Lewisburg FmHA office to close this week

LEWISBURG — The Lewisburg county office of the Farmers Home Administration will be closed three days from October 29 to October 31 to permit the employees to attend the annual statewide FmHA meeting at York.

Michael R. Orendo, FmHA county supervisor said the office will reopen for regular business at 8 a.m., November 3.

Approximately 190 FmHA employees from all the county and district offices in Pennsylvania and from the state office in Harrisburg

are expected at the state meeting.

State and national FmHA officials will evaluate the agency's services of the past year and review FmHA objectives, methods and techniques necessary to serve the ever-changing needs of rural areas in Pennsylvania.

County Supervisor Orendo

said that FmHA, as the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, attracts private capital to rural areas as well as makes direct loans to farmers, homeowners and small towns.
