
The 300,000th celebrity led off the feeder pig sale and brought a respectable \$2.75 a pound. It was purchased by Lancaster Stockyards at the final rap of the gavel by auctioneer Merle Eberly.

The Stockyards opened the first graded feeder pig auction in this area in June, 1974. It started as a monthly auction, increased to twice a month and finally weekly when consignments reached as high as 3600 head.

The value of the 300,000 feeders auctioned off during the past six or so years totals approximately \$16 million.-DA

HARRISBURG - September 1980 egg production in Pennsylvania totaled 339 million according to the Pennsylvanıa Crop Reporting Service. The September production was six percent above the 321 million ergs produced in September 1.79.

The September average of 16.2 million layers was three percent high than a year ago. Egg production per 100 layers was 2069 compared with 2043 in September 1979.


