Grange policy to develop as much hydroelectricity sites as possible in Pennsylvania was reaffirmed. Further, all existing hydroelectric generating facilities developed on publicly-owned ground and water should be owned by the nation, not the state or the local municipality.

Support was also given to an increased effort on sulfur emission research to make Pennsylvania a more marketable product.

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
