seventh annual North American International Livestock Exposition got underway on November 8 at the Kentucky Fair and Exposition Center here in Louisville. Exhibitors from far and wide unloaded their best dairy cattle to compete in the Open Dairy Show.

The grand champion Holstein bull was exhibited by Bonanza, of Ridgeville, Indiana. The bull, Creek-A-Lee Peacemaker, placed first in his class of yearlings before being tagged grand champion.

The reserve grand champion Holstein bull was

The grand champion female was the first-place aged cow and senior champion, Strickler Double Cinders. She was exhibited by Quietcove Holstein Farm, Wapakoneta, Ohio.

Following her in the Aged Cow class and as reserve Senior champion was the entry of Ransdell Dairy, Salvisa, Kentucky. Ransdell Astro Christine was tagged Reserve Grand Champion Female of the Open Holstein Show.

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Lynn and Bonnie Miller of Towanda, Bradford County, took second place in the Holstein Junior Heifer Calf competition with their entry, Royal Haven Blossom.

In the Two-Year-Old Holstein class, Ralph Moore, Mercer, took third place with his entry Amore Bootmaker Mindy. And in the Three-Year-Old competition, Edward and Eleanor Karpa, Arella, placed second with Karpa Model Maker Alice.

Brown Swiss Show Judge Fred Foreman, Ames, Iowa, looked at more than 100 head vying for the championship slots during the Brown Swiss Open Show on November 10.

Emerging as the grand champion bull was Senior Yearling, Alpine Hills Enterprise, owned by Alpine Hills Farms, Corinth, Kentucky.

Reserve Champion Bull honors went to Lazy Acre Farm, Scottsville, Kentucky, with their entry, Manions Design Joe, a bull calf, born October 2, 1979.

Female Award was won by Meander Evening Out, a nine-year-old cow, owned and shown by Sand Rock Farm, Rocky Ridge, Maryland.

The reserve champion female of the Brown Swiss Show was Mayfair Gusty Sina Sue, a 7-year-old cow, shown by Susan Cone, Salem, Illinois.

Bob Griggs of Mustang, Oklahoma, had to be a happy man at the conclusion of the National Guernsey Show. Grigg's cow carried off honors for premier breeder, premier exhibitor and exhibitor's herd. In addition, his Circleview Darimost Maisy, a nine-year-old cow, won the Reserve Grand Champion Female honors and was second place as best uddered cow.

For exhibitor's herd Griggs had to show five cows, two which had calved, two which had not and a fifth cow of any age; three of the cows had to be bred by him and all had to have been owned by him. Premier

The Grand Champion breeder was decided on a point basis on six animals in the open single classes, including both his own animals and those bred by him but exhibited by others.

The J. and D. Mithoefer and family of Claypool, Indiana, had the Grand Champion Female award with their two-year-old cow Jualmi Top Jollye Candy. The cow also won the best udder award.

Dardenella Farm, Orangeburg, South Carolina, showed the best three females and were runnersup in the exhibitor's herd Third-place class. exhibitor's herd went to the Floyd Wachtel family from Big Prairie, Ohio.

In their first visit to the North American International Livestock Exposition, the Mortson family of Queensville, Ont., Canada, captured the grand championship female honors. Their four-year-old Jersey cow, Echo Brook Samare's Noreen, followed up her junior show win by taking the Grand Champion Female title in the All American Jersey Show.

Reserve Grand Champion went to an entry from Greenland Farms, Hopkinsville, Ky., another four year-old cow, A.S.M. Miss America of CJF, this year's National Jersey Jug Futurity winner.

Although the dairy portion of the gigantic North American International Livestock Exposition was winding down after several event-filled days, the Ayr-shire Show did not lose momentum.


Over 100 Ayrshires paraded around the showring during the show which offered \$5000 in premiums and awards. Judging the event was Fred Foreman.
