

National wool growers to meet

LANCASTER — Leaders in the areas of distributing and financing lamb and wool products will headline program activities at the 116th meeting of the National Wool Growers Association when it gets underway in San Antonio, Jan. 25-28, 1981.

Producers Council, the promotional arm of the U.S. sheep industry, will address the meeting.

"There is continued interest and expansion in the sheep industry," said Marvin Cronberg, NWGA president, "and we need to look at these demand areas so we don't oversupply the available market." Cronberg also noted that traditional problem areas of research, predation and public land issues would be scrutinized.

U.S. Congressman E. "Kika" De La Garza of Texas and Tom Lefler will analyze legislative trends under the new administration. Jack Barton of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas will look at livestock financial demand and supply.

Barry Flinchbaugh, assistant to the president of Kansas State University will analyze effective political action by small organizations, and Chris Jouffas, the Colorado sheep rancher who is president of the American Sheep

R.J. Rich of Burley, Idaho, who serves as chairman of the board of the NWGA, said the concerns of sheepmen go far beyond the traditional coyote problems. "We're concerned about the diet-health controversy as it relates to the consumption of lamb," he said. Rich also stressed that the renewal of the Wool Act is a legislative priority for 1981, as is import relief.

"We'll be discussing these issues and trying to evaluate their impact on our present growth trend," Rich said. A post convention cruise on a paddle-wheeler from New Orleans will round out the 116th meeting agenda.
