Survey reveals public concern for USDA programs

HARRISBURG - Individuals across the United States voiced a general support of existing, voluntary USDA programs, reports a spokesman for the Soil Conservation Service, a branch of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Through the Resources Conservation Act, more than 118,000 persons provided over one and one-half million comments on USDA programs. It gave the public an opportunity to voice their opinions on the future programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said the spokesman.

According to the responses, Americans highly value the Nation's soil, water, and related resources. Respondents voiced a strong concern about the capacity of the Nation's resources to meet future needs.

Strong,port was ex- incentives for providing pressed for traditional proper natural resources USDA objectives relating to conservation and the preservation of agricultural land. The concept of reducing soil erosion was supported as the cornerstone of USDA conservation programs.

Most favored conservation practices were conservation tillage, drainage, erosion control measures, and flood control. Least support was voiced for the wetland retention policies.

Alternative strategies for addressing the conservation problems of the Nation were included in the evaluation. Most responses favored either redirecting present conservation programs or a program of conservation performance bonuses. Under the conservation bonus strategy, landowners would receive financial

management. The least support was found for regulatory programs and for a program of cross compliance. Cross compliance would mean that farmers would have to participate in a full conservation program to receive other USDA programs such as crop subsidies and low interest loans.

The report revealed the public generally believed that the existing programs of USDA are effective although agencies could do an even better job with more funding. The public also said agencies could provide more technical assistance if the programs were more efficient.

Strong support was voiced for a positive export policy and a need for a good farm energy conservation program. Respondents ondersed the traditional


American concept of small family farms and supported the preservation of farmland for agricultural use.

Eduction and research were expressed as the proper role for grovernment in natual resource conservation. Strong objections were made to government regulation.

Of the 118,000 responses received, nearly 75 percent came from individuals.

Greatest response was from the South. The more densely populated Northeast had the smallest portion of responses. Approximately 25 percent of the responses came from farmers and ranchers with an equal share coming from employes of federal, state, and local governments.
