

caused rotting from lack of air in the soil. Since rhododendrons will continue to lose moisture from their evergreen leaves throughout the winter, a few precautions now will help

If water is restricted in your community, use waste water from the bathtub, dishpan, or rinse cycle of the clothes washer Some detergent will not harm the plants, providing the soil can be scratched lightly for aeration. Water plants until the ground freezes.






inches deep will help keep

temperature. Keep the mulch a few inches away from the base to allow the bark to harden before winter. A windoreak of burlap will reduce moisture loss from bright sun or high winds. Stakes may be set in place now and burlap added about mid-December when the ground freezes. If this is an annual problem, move your rhodendrons to a more sheltered location next spring.

Flower buds have already formed on rhododendrons and should open normally next spring as a reward for these precautions taken now.
