

Harris to retire from Lehigh ag society

ALLENTOWN — William T. Harris, Jr., is retiring as president of the Lehigh County Agricultural Society after six years of dedicated and energetic service in his second stint at the helm of the institution that sponsors the Allentown Fair.

Harris succeeded Edward G. Leidig who died in October, 1974. Leidig was named to the post upon Harris's retirement in 1964 after a successful five year regime.

"In 1959 I looked upon the society presidency as a challenge, which I feel I met with the help of similarly dedicated, concerned

Allentown Fair supporters," Harris said in announcing his retirement.

"I approached my second administration with the same feelings - this time with an almost entirely new team of like-minded people, without whose backing and tireless efforts the Allentown Fair could not have retained its status as one of the nation's great county fairs," he said.

While not boasting of great advances during his years at the helm, Harris points out that sound business practices have enabled the society to remain viable when many

other county fairs have folded.

"Despite the economic and cultural upheavals we are experiencing, I am confident the Allentown Fair will be part of our community for many more years — providing its officers continue the strong aggressive policies we have instituted and which have allowed us to remain strong," Harris said.

His lifelong interest and devotion to the fair will remain high, even though he'll be just another stockholder, he said.

One of his final recom-

mendations as president was that Martin H. Ritter be elected his successor.

In a letter to stockholders informing them of his intentions, Harris said: "I think that there is no one better qualified to assume the duties of the presidency. I am confident he will lend his expertise in assisting the executive committee in its operation of the Allentown Fair."

Harris's successor will be chosen at the annual meeting of stockholders December 10 in the fair Agricultural Hall.

Egg output increases

HARRISBURG — October 1980 egg production in Pennsylvania totaled 361 million, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

The October production was eight percent above the 333 million eggs produced in October 1979. The October average of 16.4 million layers was two percent higher than a year ago. Egg

production per 100 layers was 2,196 compared with 2,077 in October 1979.

The nation's laying flocks produced 5.92 billion eggs during October, one percent more than the 5.87 billion produced a year ago. The number of layers for October averaged 291 million, compared with 290 million a year earlier.

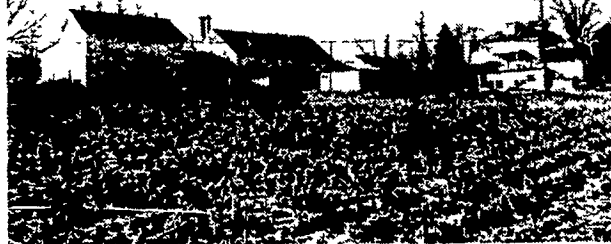
