

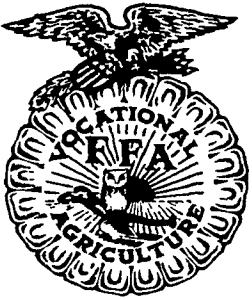
Cedar Crest FFA attends convention

Animal scientist wins Clover Award

PENNSYLVANIA — James P. Gallagher, extension animal scientist at The Pennsylvania State University has been named recipient of the first Clover Award presented by the Pennsylvania Association of Extension 4-H and Youth Workers.

The award is presented to a person, not a member of the organization, who has made significant contributions to youth programs.

Carol Schurman, Indiana County Extension agent and awards committee chairperson, said Gallagher was cited for development of the Pennsylvania 4-H horse program, including project materials and leadership training.

In charge of the State 4-H Horse Show, Gallagher worked closely with 4-H leaders in developing production classes for show in addition to the traditional riding and showmanship classes.

The award winner was instrumental in organizing the National 4-H Horse and Collegiate Horse Judging Contests and the National 4-H Horse Bowl.

He also assisted in the development of educational horse programs for handicapped youth and adults.

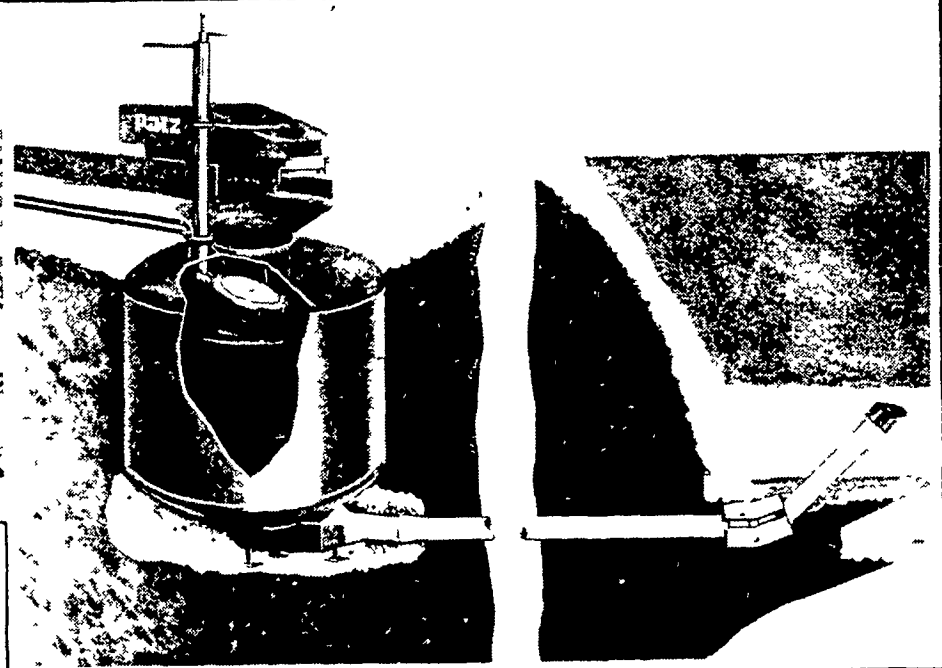
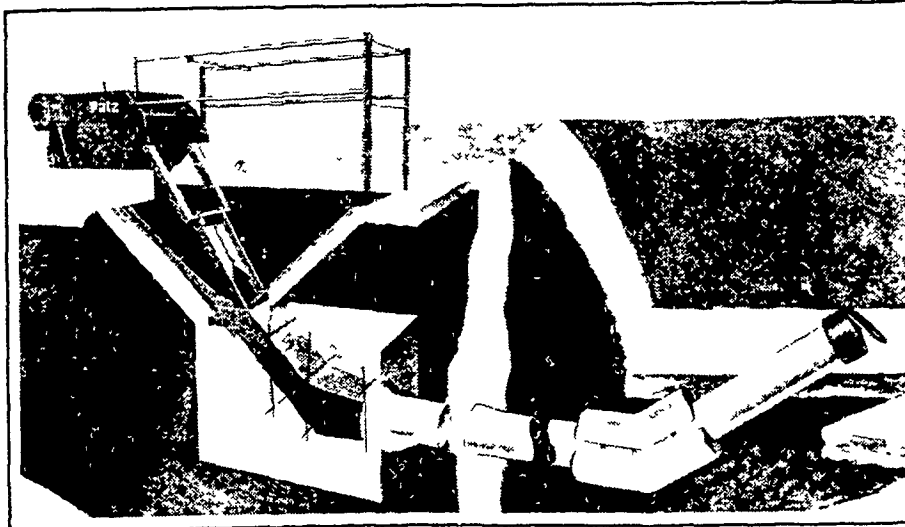
