can earn more money

LITITZ — Higher annual farm and nonfarm labor employment earnings will be permitted in 1981 before deductions for federal social security benefits according to Doctor John W. Wysong, extension farm management specialist and professor of agricultural economics at the University of Maryland As before, retirees over 72 years of age have no ceiling on their earnings that might cause a reduction in their social security benefits. However, notes Doctor Wysong, workers aged 65 to 71 will now be able to earn up to \$5500 per year without losing any of their usual benefits.

Retirees under 65 years of age will now be able to earn \$4080 before benefits begin to be reduced.

Wysong reports the new ceilings are intended to offset changes in wage rates due to inflation in the general economy. When there is more moneycurrency and credit-available then there are

goods and services to purchase, consumer and producer prices tend to rise, and wages also increase Improvements in labor and capital productivity can help to offset this rise

It is expected, according to Doctor Wysong, that the higher earnings ceilings for retirees will encourage some persons to re-enter the labor force to remain in it on a part-time basis. It should be helpful to older farmers and farm workers.
