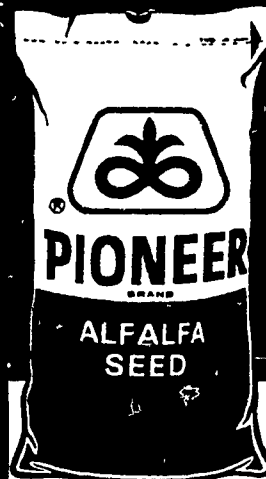
Clyde Forney, son of Mr and Mrs. Clarence Forney of Lebanon, has been named a recipient of the Keystone Farmer Degree.

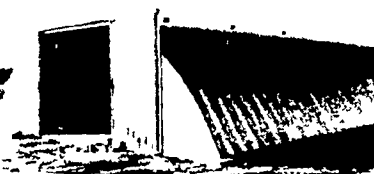
