Some of these cards show parks, buildings and methods of transportation that no longer exist. There were not as many pictures in newspapers in the early 1900's as there are now and therefore cards were brought to see the results of floods, accidents and fires

One card was printed which showed the destruction by fire of Reilly Bros. & Raub in Lancaster in 1910 As fire equipment was horse drawn, some had to be brought by train from Columbia on flat cars to fight the fire

Many of my postcards were sent on birthdays, Valentine and Christmas Some were printed in Germany and are beautiful as they still have fancy sparkles sprinkled on them Often they contain messages about a meeting or a Sunday visit Telephones were few and the mail was quite reliable for only one cent postage.

been destroyed Getting from place to place was difficult and slow but excursions went to places like Hershey and Atlantic City Even in the 30's my great uncle would take a trolley from Lancaster and then walk four miles to our home on Memorial Day which was then called Decoration Day And I can remember, when I was quite small, walking miles from the trolley line to our home after a Sunday School picnic at Lititz Park. How to grow blueberries

Currently, there is great interest among home gardners who desire a few plants for home use, and in commercial planting for pickyour-own purposes.

The soil pH is an important point to consider when planting blueberries They thrive in acid soils with a pH of 4.8 to 5.2. Above that range, their leaves usually turn vellow. This condition is known as iron chlorosis The soil should be tested before planting blueberries. The results of a reliable soil test will include recommendations pertaining to soil pH and fertilizing.



LIMA - Many areas of young roots are very sensitive and may be injured by climatic conditions that will improper fertilizer grow blueberries well, says materials. Incorporate the necessary acidifying materials into the soil.

> If possible, once plants are set, they should be thoroughly watered to make good soil contact with the roots

> After planting, apply four to six inches of mulch. Sawdust, shredded bark, rotted or spoiled hay and pine needles all are good mulching materials The mulch should extend 15 to 18 inches on either side of the plant Mulch assures better soil moisture levels and reduces weed competition
