Pa. potato stocks off

HARRISBURG - Total stocks of potatoes stored in Pennsylvania on January 1, 1981, were 2,500,000 cwt, 24 percent less than a year ago, according to the Penn-sylvania Crop Reporting Service

Current total stocks are 60 percent of this year's production of 4,180,000 cwt. compared with 55 percent on hand a year ago

An estimated 144 million cwt of potatoes for all uses were in storage in the fall producing states on January 1, 1981 This is 18 percent less

than what was on hand at the same time last year and a 26 percent decline from January 1, 1979.

Disappearance of the 1980 fall crop to January 1, 1981 was 10 million cwt, one percent above the same period a year ago This total disappearance to date includes 16 1 million cwt. of potatoes that were dumped during grading, fed to livestock on potato farms, discarded without grading and loss due to shrinkage (moisture loss)





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
