The thrust of the resolution was to tughten farm water conservation measures and to encourage municipalities to do the same.

The resolution was submitted by the state Rural Electric Association It would have put the Councl on record opposing any change to disproportionately ncrease the cost of electric power to farmers

Former U.S. Congressman George Goodling, representing the state engaged in a sharp if somewhat disjounted debate somewhat an REA representative about the need fof REA financing at interest rates lower than prevailing costs. At least three other groups joined in vetoing the proposed resolution.
REA sald the possibility exists the group may withdraw from the Councl of Farm Organzations.
An old resolution calling for marketing and bargaming legislation for ag producers again was approved The State Food Processors Association again refrained from vetoing, choosing instead to abstain from voting
