Senate names chairmen for ag subcommittees

WASHINGTON, D C. — Senator Jesse Helms, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry, last week announced the selection of Subcommittee Chairmen

At the same time, Chairman Helms said the Committee has agreed to a slight reorganization of the Subcommittees.

The number of Subcommittees has been increased from seven to eight.

Two new Subcommittees have been created from the former Subcommittee on Environment, Soil Conservation, and Forestry They are: Subcommittee on Soil and Water Conservation, with Senator Roger W. Jepsen of Iowa as Chairman; and Subcommittee on Forestry, Water Resources, and Environment, with Senator S I. (Sam) Hayakawa of California as Chairman.

Also, the Subcommittee on Rural Development has been explained

to the Subcommittee on Rural Development, Oversight, and Investigations, with Senator Mark Andrews of North Dakota as Chairman.

The Subcommittees their chairmen and members are.

Soil and Water Conservation (Subcommittee No 1) — Senator Jepsen, chairman, with Republican Senators Thad Cochran of Mississippi and Hayakawa, and Democrat Senators Howell Heflin of Alabama and Walter D (Dee) Huddleston of Kentucky, who is also ranking Minority member of the full Committee.

Agricultural Credit and Rural Electrification (Subcommittee No. 2) — Senator Paula Hawkins of Florida, Chairman, with Republican Senators Jepsen and Andrews; and Democrat Senators Edward Zorinsky of Nebraska, Heflin, and David L. Boren of Oklahoma.

Take credit for your work - sign it

MEDIA — If you are an amateur artist or craftsperson, you should sign and date all your work, no matter what it is, says Maryetta Dorricott, Delaware County home economist

Most people sign or at least initial paintings, but they often neglect to identify other works as their own Yet countless hours go into the making of a quilt, or a ceramic pot or a piece of silver jewelry and most of us hope our work will be handed down to future generations.

The way you sign your work should be compatible with the

work itself. For example, functional items usually have signatures hidden or worked into the design The signature should always be in proportion to the size of the object A tiny piece of metal work requires a tiny signature

Dorricott suggests that a signature could be embossed in the bottom of a piece of wooden ware A stamp may be most appropriate for metal work A quilt or braided rug may require the craftsperson to embroider the signature and date onto a small piece of cloth and stitch it to the underside of the item

Foreign Agricultural Policy (Subcommittee No 6) — Senator, Boschwitz, Chairman, with Republican Senators Lugar, Cochran, Dole, Jepsen, and Mrs Hawkins, and Democrat Senators Dixon, Pryor, Boren and Zorinsky Nutrition (Subcommittee No 7) — Senator Dole, Chairman, with Republican Senators Hayakawa, Lugar and Mrs. Hawkir.s, and Democrat Senators Leahy, Melcher and Dixon

Forestry, Water Resources, and Environment (Subcommittee N_0 8) — Senator Hayakawa, Chairman, with Republican Senator Jepsen; and Democrat Senator Melcher.

The Committee also adopted rules for this Session of Congress, which are identical to those of the 96th Congress, and approved the Committee's internal operating budget.
