Roadside market meeting to begin

GETTYSBURG — Rising energy costs indicate tough times ahead for direct-to-the-consumer marketers of farm products. So says John W. Gird, Extension energy programs specialist and agricultural engineer-ing instructor at the University of Maryland. Gird is expected to expand on this statement when he speaks Monday morning, February 16, at the 14th annual Maryland-Pennsylvania Roadside Marketing

Conference.

The conference will run from Sunday evening through Tuesday afternoon, February 15 to 17 at the Sheraton Motor Inn, located two miles south of Gettysburg, on the business route of U.S. highway 15.

Gird points out that the direct marketing business is particularly sensitive to high energy costs because farmers are already faced with devoting 30 percent of their expense to fuel bills.

They must pass these higher costs of production on to consumers if they are to stay in business. And fewer consumers may be willing to incur the additional time and gasoline expense to shop at roadside markets "off the beaten track."

"There are no simple

solutions to problems raised by the energy outlook," Gird cautions. But he lists some suggestions which may help to make things easier for roadside marketers:

Carefully choose your location;

Collectivize into farmersmarkets;

Make plans for fuel conservation on tractor engines.

The roadside marketing conference is again sponsored by the Extension Service at Penn State and the University of Maryland, with support from an informal consortium of farmer-to-consumer

marketing organizations in the two states.

Gird's talk will be part of a full Monday morning general session devoted to "Energy and the Direct Marketer." Other program topics will include estate planning and cost control.

Drought workshop

HARRISBURG — The Pennsylvania Chamber of Commerce and the

Department of Environmental Resources are co-sponsoring a half-day workshop on February 24 in Harrisburg, to explore the problems caused by drought conditions which now exist in 50 of the state's 67 counties.

The session is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. in Harrisburg Building 2 at 333 Market Street. There is no charge, but because attendance is limited to 200 persons, those who would like to participate should call the State Chamber at 717/255-3268.

Subjects to be covered include the extent of the drought, the 1981 outlook, and methods for conserving industrial water usage. DER officials will discuss actions taken or contemplated by DER and the Delaware River Basin Commission, and local rationing plans presently being considered.

In addition, spokesmen will offer suggestions on how industries can conserve water usage.

Governor Dick Thornburgh declared a drought emergency in 50 Pennsylvania counties last November 16. As of January 16, 69 water systems in the state were experiencing severe water shortage problems, and 27 of them have instituted rationing plans.

DER has reported some water supplies have ebbed to 30-day reserves.

The last major drought to hit the Northeast lasted from September 1961 to September 1966, and affected 50 million people in 14 states. It increased unemployment, reduced crops, and led to a record number of forest fires.
