of leaves and are getting crowded Water an hour or more before the move With a pot label or knife blade, carefully lift the seedlings with as much soil clinging to the roots as possible. Handle gently by the leaves as you reset the plants 2 to 4 inches apart in flats, or one seedling to an individual container

With your finger, poke a hole for each seedling and plant it at the same depth it stood before, unless the stem is very elongated Then set down to the first pair of leaves Firm the planting mix over the roots and water weil Shade the seedlings during the brightest part of the day if there's any wilting

Asters, Snapdragons, Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Head Lettuce and Onions can stand light

frost All the other flowers and vegetables mentioned previously cannot take any frost and must not be transplanted outside until all danger of cold weather is over.

About a week before transfer time to the garden, accustom (harden off) the seedlings to outdoor life by increasing the ventilation, lowering the temperature and decreasing the water Better yet, move the plants outside into a light, protected place on warm days Shelter at night if low temperatures are forecast A cold frame is an ideal place to toughen seedlings Follow seed packet directions for proper outdoor planting and culture of your garden-ready seedlings

Even if you live in warm areas, you'll find it helpful to start a few special items in a cold frame, or flats or pots in a place protected from heavy rain or strong wind

## Hidden costs in mobile home purchase explained

YORK – A prospective mobile home buyer should look for certain construction features before making a choice, says Jean Lamberson, home economist

Brands and models of mobile homes differ in stud spacing, number of beams, duct size and locations, and insulation As a rule, the more you pay for a mobile home, the more you get in terms of quality features Ask mobile home dealers for a list of construction details to justify the extra cost of a high priced unit.

authorized inspection agency certifying that Federal mobile home construction and safety standards have been met

It is wise to choose an energyefficient mobile home to cut down on heating and cooling requirements Check the inside of the unit for the amount of insulation, furnace size, duct, and thermostat locations, ventilation patterns, and ability to close off areas within the home. Also look for features such as storm doors and windows, and weather stripping


On the outside, use of shade, wind breaks, roof covers, and light or dark colors can affect the performance of a heating or cooling system. Skirting the home

should look for the label of an conserves heat, and shading windows and roofs lowers inside summer temperatures.

Choose a floor plan that is suitable for your way of living. Consider the traffic pattern, storage space and lighting.

To save lives and property, it is important to anchor the mobile home adequately to the ground. Federal standards require manufacturers of all new mobile homes to provide for the attachment of an anchor system and to include instructions for installing the system.

The mobile home owner is usually responsible for providing some anchoring equipment and having it installed But some anchoring may be furnished by the mobile home park owner



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
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
