

Power Play son commands top price

HARRISBURG — A sudden snow storm deterred few buyers at the Angus Breeding Sale held March 5 at the Pennsylvania Farm Equipment Exposition in the Farm Show Complex, Harrisburg. The sale grossed \$82,855

The 67 uniform, high quality Angus cattle offered averaged \$1275 per head. Ten bulls averaged \$1943, while 57 females averaged \$1160.

The top selling bull, an early summer yearling named Instant Replay, sold for \$6400. The bull was consigned by Penn State. Walter Bishop, Jr. of Glen Kerry Farm, Greenwood, South Carolina, was

the successful bidder. Instant Replay, is the son of "Power Play," 1979 Supreme Champion Angus Bull at the All-American Angus Futurity.

A York County farm from Glen Rock consigned the top selling Angus female Rishels Edlyn Farm sold their March 1980 heifer calf for \$3,000 to R.E. Stitzel of Shelby, North Carolina. The calf was the daughter of "Bon View Connection."

The Angus Breeding Sale was sponsored by the Pennsylvania Angus Association in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Farm Equipment Exposition.

Order 4 base \$14.18

ALEXANDRIA, Va. — Middle Atlantic Order Market Administrator Joseph D. Shine Tuesday announced a February 1981 base milk price of \$14.18 per hundredweight and an excess milk price of \$12.57.

The weighted average February price is \$14.07 and the butterfat differential for the month is 16.9 cents. The base milk price increased six cents from the previous month and is \$1.13 higher than last February's base price.

The advertising withholding rate, which is deducted from the base and excess milk price only and not the weighted average price, was 13 cents a hundredweight this month compared to seven cents a year ago.

The gross value of producer milk during February was \$64.3 million,

compared to \$56.2 million a year ago. A total of \$595.5 thousand was deducted for advertising and promotion in February 1981 contrasted to \$305.6 thousand in February 1980.

Shine said producer receipts totaled 458.1 million pounds during February; on a daily basis, this was an increase of 2.3 percent from the previous month, and 8.7 percent above last February.

Class I producer milk totaled 228.7 million pounds and accounted for 49.93 percent of total producer milk receipts during the month, down from 51.06 percent in January and well below the 54.56 Class I utilization percentage last February.

Base milk accounted for 85.35 percent of total producer milk receipts in February, down from 88.03 percent a year earlier.

In Schuylkill County and across the state, PCEA functions primarily to provide advice to Penn State so extension service can develop programs that will improve the quality of life for Pennsylvanians.

At the Legislative banquet, Pennsylvania Secretary of Agriculture Penrose Hallowell, welcomed the committee members and read a statement sent by Governor Dick Thornburgh.

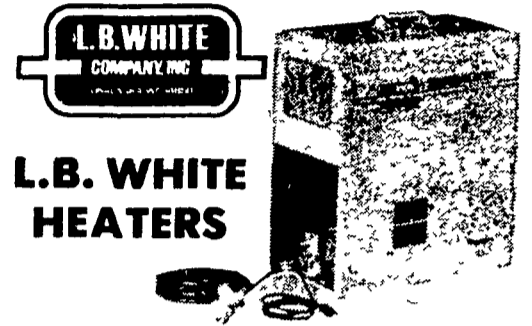

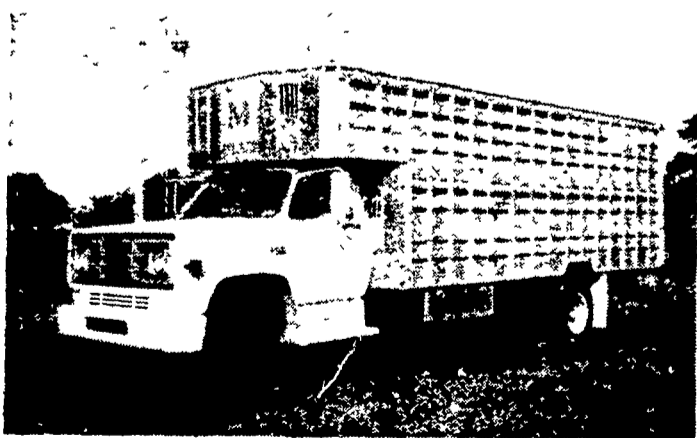
