My intention was to write about a recent trip to Winterthui Museum in Delaware. A group from our church toured room after room of Early. American Colonial and Georgian furniture. Henry Shreiner He was a surveyor and Justice of the Peace in Manheim Fownship for many-decades As I ve always lived in this area the names in the book are familiar to me as the same families still reside here

He surveyed roads and tarms and divided land into lots. He wrote wills, drew deeds and clerked at sales. He acted as an arbitrator when a dispute arose among neighbors.

He also must have been cutting down a very large stand of white and black oak as there are many entries of selling a cord of wood for one or two dollars

Sometimes he received cash for his work but many times it was paid in labor or something else. One time to balance an account he received 35 gallons of whiskey at 22 cents a gallon. Another time when a man owed \$112 over a period of a year, he paid in full by digging a well.

Cows were sold from \$8 to \$9 each and pigs brought 4 cents and 5 cents per pound for a 200 pound animal. Apparently some men worked for him and entries in the ledger read,. Money for parade 20 cents, plug of tobacco 4 cents, Dr. Brenneman for medicine 1212 cents, and an alimanac for 614 cents.

I find it intriguing to read of the activities in the 1820's and wonder it, 150 years from now, someone will find present day pursuits interesting

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
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
