Guernsey cows produce high records

OXFORD — Two registered Guernsey cows in the herd of K.D. Linde-Lindenhof, Oxford, have recently completed top official DHIR actual production records, according to The American Guernsey Cattle Club.

All cows were milked two times a day. The testing was supervised by Penn State University, University Park.

Lindenhof D Fortune Gerda, a five year old, produced 18920 pounds of milk and 923 pounds of fat, in 365 days.

Lindenhof Fargos Erika, a five year old, produced 17730 pounds of milk and 887 pounds of fat, in 365 days.

In addition, Penn Del Fabian Blonde, a five year old, registered Guernsey cow, owned by Raymond & Louise Witmer-Penn-Del Farm, has completed an official DHIR actual production record of 18430 pounds of milk and 985 pounds of butterfat, in 305 days, two times a day milking, according to The American Guernsey Cattle Club.

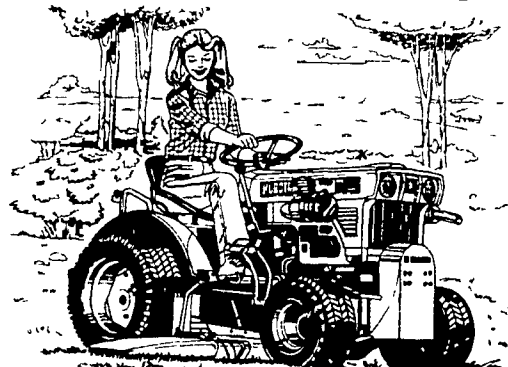
