

Stanford sweeps the East with 17 N.C.G.A. corn yield champions

TOP YIELD IN THE U.S. GOES TO NK'S PX 74

The National Corn Grower's Association National Yield Championship came to the East this year - for the first time ever - with a giant 230.51 bu/acre yield at the Beckley, West Virginia Bluestone Farms operated by Jim Justice.

This is the second year in a row that PX 74 has taken the national title. Stanford has been recommending this hybrid in full season areas for its wide adaptation and very fast dry-down.

PX 74's yield power placed it first or second in nine state yield contests across the country.

Gary Donaldson of Hackettstown won with PX 87 and a yield of 160.12 bu/acre.



NATIONAL CORN GROWER'S ASSOCIATION YIELD CHAMPION JIM JUSTICE II GREW 230.51 BU/ACRE OF NK'S PX 74 ON HIS 25-ACRE CONTEST FIELD ON BLUESTONE FARMS IN BECKLEY, WEST VIRGINIA. THIS WAS THE HIGHEST NON-IRRIGATED YIELD IN THE NATION IN THE PRESTIGIOUS N.C.G.A. CONTEST.

SECOND PLACE IN THE NATION WAS ALSO PX 74, ENTERED BY JIM'S FATHER, JAMES C. JUSTICE. IT YIELDED 220.21 BU/ACRE.

Bradley Hott of Franklin won with PX 79 and a yield of 165.30 bu/acre.
