DER sheet explains drought erosion control

HARRISBURG — The Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources has published a fact sheet explaining methods of erosion and sedimentation control for landowners and developers to use during drought emergencies.

According to Walter N. Peechatka, director of DER's Bureau of Soil and Water Conservation, valuable topsoil can be lost to wind and water erosion, even during a drought, and state law requires that earthmovers take steps to prevent erosion, which can lead to water pollution.

Regulations adopted in 1972 under the Clean Streams Law require landowners to develop erosion and sedimentation control plans (E and S Plans) before earthmoving is begun.

If the tract of land to be exposed is larger than 25 acres, the landowner or developer must submit the E and S Plan to the County Conservation District, which then will issue a permit for the activities.

On tracts of land smaller than 25 acres, an E and S Plan must be developed and kept at the site. The Plan does not require prior ap-

proval by the County Conservation District.

Revegetation of exposed soil was considered when the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Council (PEMC) adopted regulations in January, 1981, banning certain nonessential uses of water in the Delaware River Basin. PEMC regulations allow the use of freshwater for revegetation of exposed soil where an E and S Plan is required. However, only the minimum rate necessary may be used and only when adequate supplies of other water sources are not available.

According to Peechatka, while revegetation is the best way to prevent erosion, other methods may be used during a drought emergency. These include application of mulch or construction of diversion ditches to direct runoff and interceptor ditches, below disturbed areas, to collect surface water flows.

DER cautions landowners to contact their municipalities or water suppliers before proceeding with revegetation, because some suppliers have imposed local water use restrictions more stringent than the state regulations.
