Everett Rank is new ASCS administrator

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Secretary of Agriculture John Block has named Everett Rank as administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation. Rank has served as administrator-designate since March 9.

Rank, a native of Fresno, California, farmed cotton, almonds and grain.

Following 10 years of service as chairman of the Fresno County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, Rank was appointed chairman of the California State ASC committee in

1969. He held that post until named ASCS Western Regional Director in 1974.

He has been a member of the American Farm Bureau Federation for 34 years and has also served on the board of directors of the Ranchers Cotton Oil Company Cal Cot and the Clovis Sanger Gin. He was on the board of governors of the Agriculture Foundation at California State University of Fresno.

In his new position, Rank will administer policies and programs of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service through its 50 state and 2700 county offices.

Programs under that agency include those for farm commodities, cost-sharing and environmental protection, natural disaster emergencies, national defense relating to farm production, conservation, income stabilization and the handling, storage and distribution of grains and foods.
