

Indiana man selected Charolais Assn. participant

HOUSTON, Tex. — Roy Prescott of Jerome, Id. has been selected as the American-International Charolais Association's participant in the 1981 Young Cattlemen's Traveling Leadership Conference.

The Conference, sponsored by the National Cattlemen's Association, will be held from June 21-26.

Each state organization and breed affiliate has the opportunity to sponsor one young cattleman between the ages of 25 and 40 to make the trip. The NCA picks up part of the cost, but the remainder will be paid by the sponsoring affiliate.

The goals of the Conference include introducing participants to the top leadership of the cattle industry; inspiring participants to pursue leadership roles in the cattle industry; exposing participants to governmental and legislative processes; exposing participants to timely problems and issues facing the industry and ways to seek solutions; exploring techniques of problems solving and management; and providing the opportunity for fellowship which

will produce lasting friendships and associations.

Participants will begin the Conference in Denver, Co., where they will take part in discussions about the NCA and emerging trends in the cattle industry. They will tour the new NCA headquarters building currently under construction.

The next stop for the cattlemen will be Sioux City, Iowa, where they will tour the IBP's Dakota City Beef Processing Plant.

Chicago will be the next stop for the cattlemen. They will visit the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, where the group will watch the cattle futures market open and hear the presentations on the role of commodity futures marketing. An Elanco corporate jet will then fly the group to Indianapolis, Inc. and the headquarters of Elanco Products Co. They will tour the firm's nearby research farm.

Next, the group will travel to Washington, D.C. where they will spend the major part of two days becoming more familiar with the processes of the federal government; how government affects the cattle business; and how that

process can be influenced. They will also be given a tour of the Capitol building and have a series of meetings with Congressional leaders. Time will be provided for visits with their own Congressmen.

The American-International Charolais Association's representative Roy Prescott, 32, was selected by the AICA's board of directors in May. He is a 1974 graduate of Brigham Young University with a B.S. degree. He majored in animal science, political science, and business. Upon leaving college, he returned to his family's ranch in Idaho to manage the operation he had helped establish and develop throughout his childhood and teenage years.

The Prescotts have a 900 head cow and calf purebred Charolais and commercial operation. In addition, they have 400 head of feeder stock. Their cattle run over 4,000 acres of deeded ground as well as 250,000 acres of BLM land.

They also farm 1,500 privately owned acres of hay, grain, beans, corn, and potatoes.

Roy Prescott has served six years as chairman of the Jerome

County Planning and Zoning Commission. Presently he is serving as president of the Star Lake Cattlemen's Association whose membership is composed of 26 ranchers.

He is also secretary-treasurer of the Western Charolais Association, vice president of the Milner Cattlemen's Association, is on the board of directors for the South Central Idaho Charolais Association, on the executive board of the American-International Charolais Association, a member of the Public Lands Committee for the National Cattlemen's Association,

and a member of the Idaho Extension Agent Livestock specialist committee.

In addition, he has served for two years as president of the Jerome Mounted Sheriff's Mounted Posse, and has been a founder and past president of the Magic Valley Jamboree Association. He presently rides in both of these groups and also in the Jerome Roping Club.

Roy Prescott and his wife, Judy, live on the T P Charolais Ranch, which is located about nine miles from Jerome. They have five children.

The guest speaker for the meeting will be John A. Maurer, a professional insurance executive with State Farm Insurance Company. The title of Maurer's

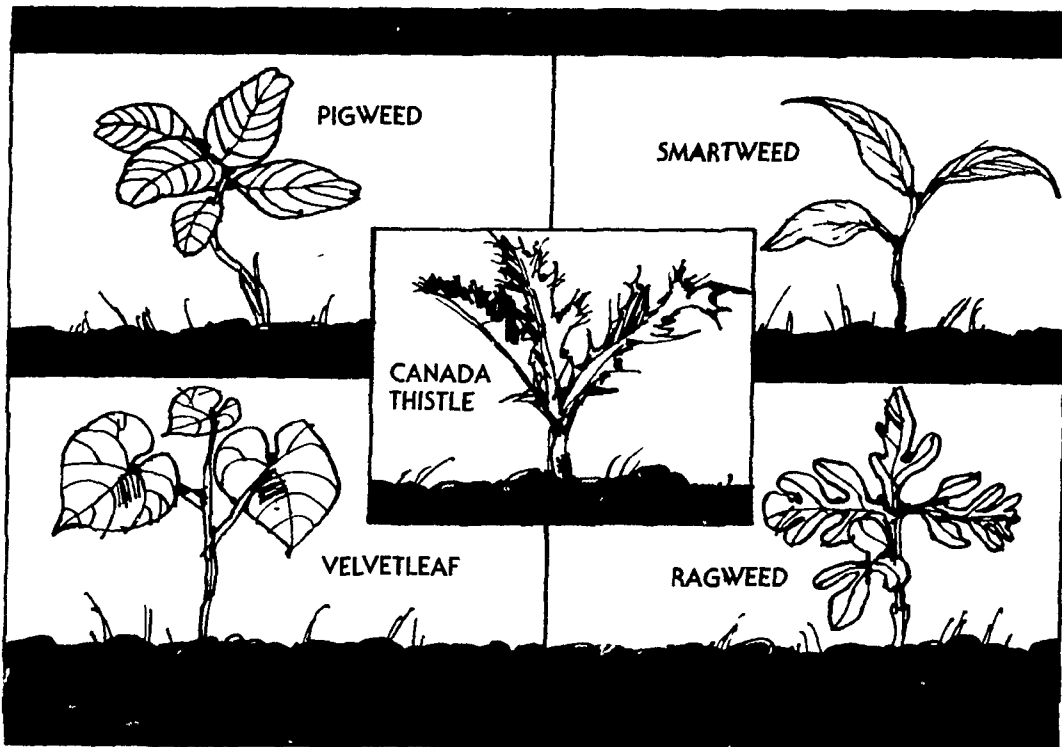
address will be "The Way It Is".
