(Continued from Page A10) cows' backs. An open ridge cap will help let the hot air escape. If necessary, remove barn siding, open doors and windows, or install a lot of side vents for good cross ventilation.

Provide cows easy access to lots of fresh clean water. Poor quality water will greatly curb intake and curtail milk production. To minimize stress, protect cows from annoying flies and minimize the amount of time cows must

stand in hot. crowded holding pens waiting to be milked. TO CLIP PASTURES

The mowing of permanent pastures at this time of year is strongly suggested. Many of the plants will be heading out and some gone to seed, and this means that the plants should be mowed. This practice will help control weeds and encourage new growth of grass.
