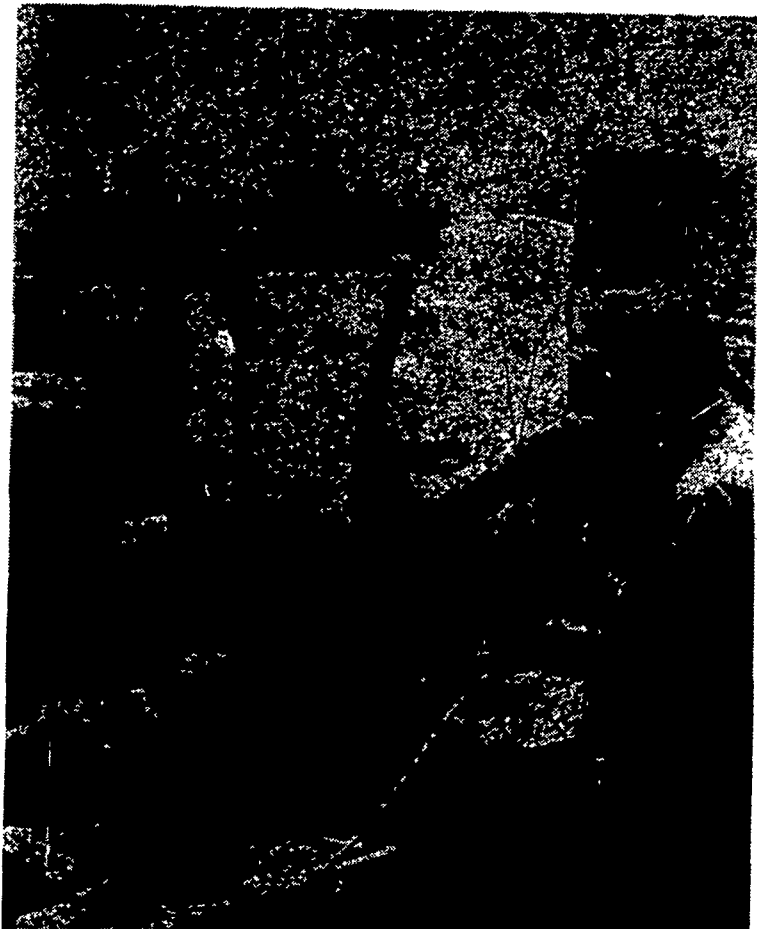

then a preplant incorporated soil application in the field before transplanting, according to Beideman.

Ridomil was put to use on the tobacco on the Charles Hummer farm.

Beideman emphasized Ridomil's uniqueness by explaining, "We are coming up with a lot of good fungicides after quite a few years with out."

Dual 8E herbicide was used to treat corn and soybeans for weed control on the farms of Hummer and Leroy Esbenshade.

Dealers and farmers were given a chance to tour the test plots and make detailed notes of each product's worth.

During a luncheon and evening hog roast, a mini-bulk was on display.

A mini-bulk is a mobile, refillable tank of up to 350-gallon capacity. The ultimate advantage of the tank is to add to the versatility of the bulk system and to eliminate container disposal.

"We feel the purpose of the tour and of the day is to show how effectively our products work and to give dealers first-hand knowledge about the herbicides. We think they'll really promote them then next spring," Beideman said.

"You can see how well they've done on these plots. A lot of credit goes to Hummer and Esbenshade, however, because they're so cooperative with us."—DK

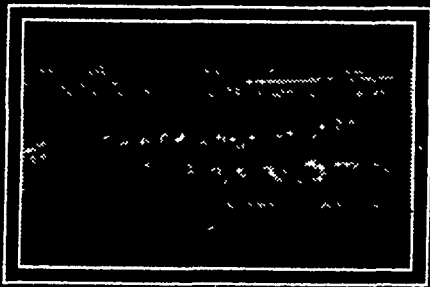

NCFC seeks new candidates

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Chairman Ralph Hofstad of the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives announces the appointment of an executive search committee to find a successor to president Kenneth D. Naden who'll be retiring in April, 1983.

Chairman of the committee is Ronald N. Goddard, executive vice president of Agway Inc., Syracuse, N.Y. Committee members include A.M. Feland III, executive vice president, Southern Farmers Association, north Little Rock, Ark.; Robert L. Gibson, president, California Cannery and growers, San Francisco; Ben F. Morgan, executive vice president, Dairymen, Inc., Louisville, Ky.; E.V. Stevenson, executive vice president, GROWMARK, Inc., Bloomington, Ill.; and Burgee O. Amdahl, president, Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of St. Paul and St. Paul Bank for Cooperatives, St. Paul, Minnesota. The committee also includes board vice chairmen Roger J. Bacigaluppi, president, California Almond Growers Exchange, Sacramento, and J.D. Marshburn, executive vice president, Citrus World, Inc., Lake Wales, Florida.

The executive search group met recently to develop qualifications for the position which Naden has held since 1963. The qualifications were unanimously adopted by the NCFC board meeting here in Washington.

Hofstad said the committee will start an immediate search for the best possible candidate to succeed Naden. He said the committee plans to have a candidate for employment as executive vice president ready for presentation at the NCFC annual meeting next January. This person, Hofstad added, will work with Naden until his retirement and, pending board approval, will assume the NCFC presidency in April, 1983.
