The next meeting will be on Tuesday, July 21 at the home of Mrs. Jacob Hartz. The program will be quilting.

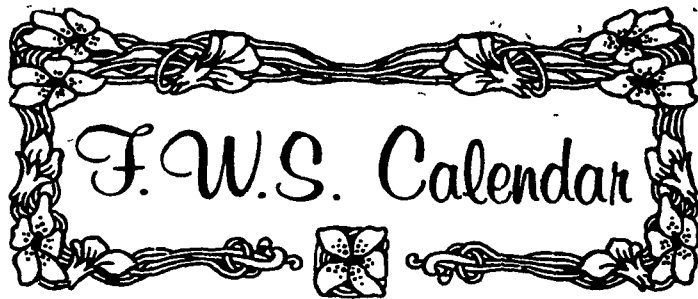
Lebanon Co. Society 20
