# Poultry markets at a glance

### Eggs

Eastern markets closed in a weak position although some trade sentiment was trying to show a little confidence due to anticipation ot the first of the month business. Cartoned egg movement is slow, pricing is extremely competitive and supplies are heavy and burdensome. Southern producers picked up a little extra shipping demand tor class 1's in Texas and Western Pennsylvania. Nest run breaking stock was increasingly available in the southeast and central states but most breakers are indifferent. The market is steady in Southern California. Large remain in plentiful supply but mediums are in balance with needs. Northern California prices will advance on mediums and hold steady on other sizes tor Monday delivery.

### **Broilers**

Most marketing areas are about steady today at the new levels of trading. As of this atternoon, orders from terminals and locally will not clear today's production at some processing plants. Advance inquiry indicates that uncommitted product is available out of next Monday to Wednesday kill. Processing confidence will be somewhat abated unless some tortuitous activity develops over

industry is tully adequate. Temperatures have moderated in most production areas and weights are mostly in a desirable range.

### Turkeys

Market weak on hens, steady on consumer toms, steady to firm on institutional toms. Inquiry and trading light centering on the West Coast on a tair volume of packer label 16-24# toms at 72 cents for August shipments into the Bay area. Light interest in the Midwest on a fill in volume of hens for current features. Inquiry in the East improved slightly on fresh hens, slow on frozen hens. Demand for institutional toms from the East on 26-34# toms at firm prices Offerings light and some inquiry going unfilled. Offerings heavy on hens, adequate on consumer toms Activity on parts centered in the East on export shipments with livers moving at 421/2 cents, hindquarters at 291/2 cents delivered Southeastern port. In the midwest, interest on drumsticks at 27 cents, tull cut wings at 26 cents and thigh meat at 63 cents delivered. Several loads of breast meat moving East at \$1.80 for late August. Canner pack interest slow. Otterings adequate to ample. Retail features light on whole turkeys, improved slightly on parts. Attractive promotions in the Midwest on
