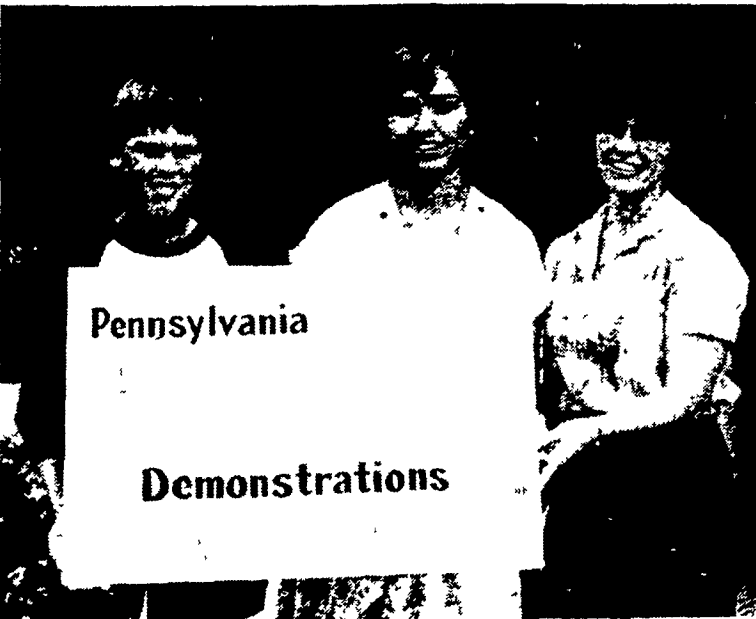

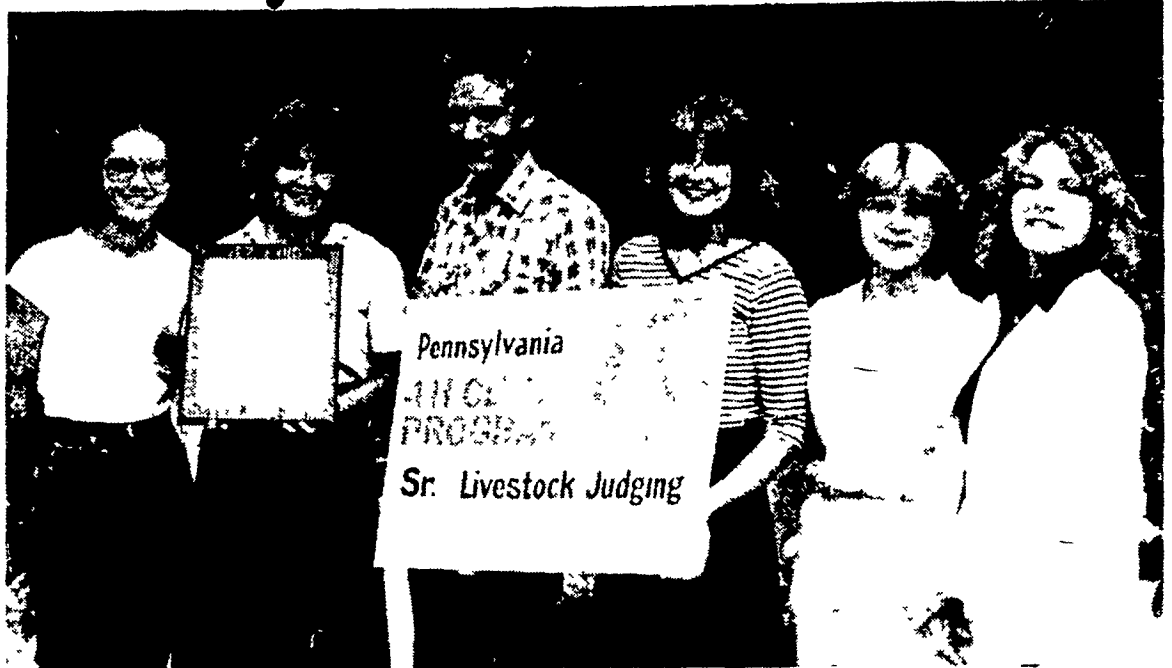
Orienteering Contest was captured by York County's Hans Sphar, Dover. Pictured with Hans is Roxanne Price, Extension youth agent in York.



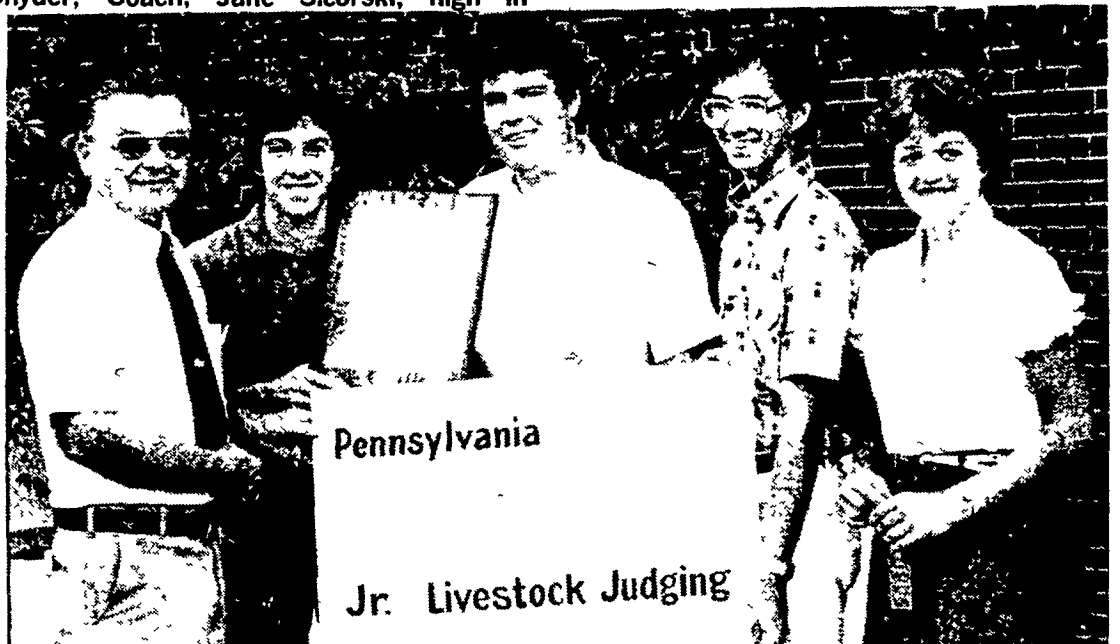

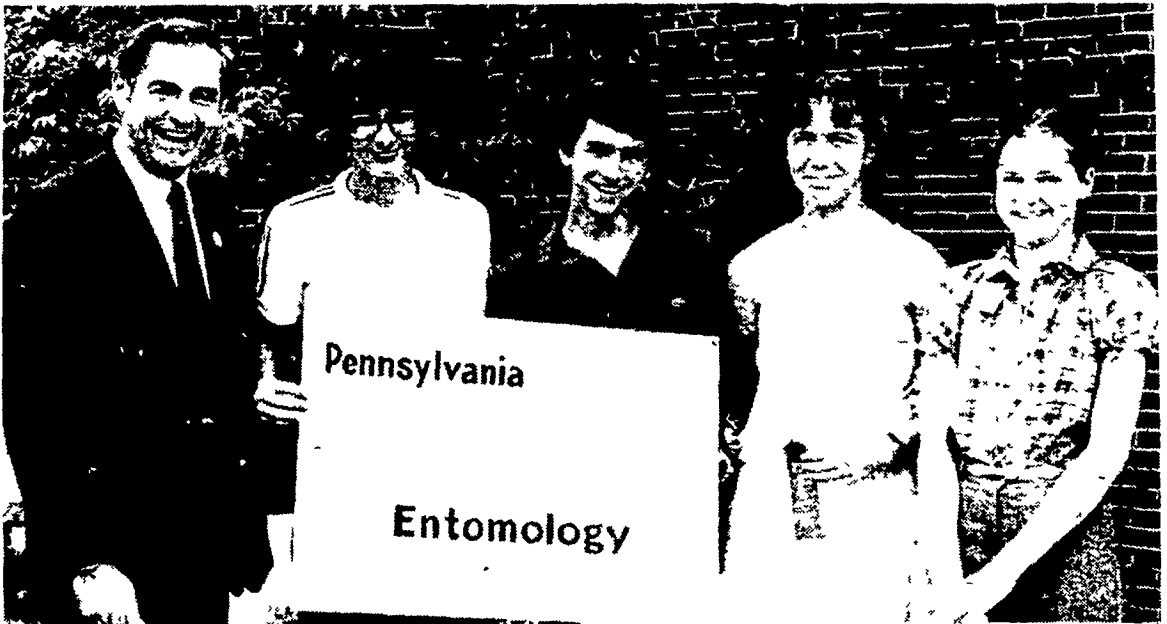

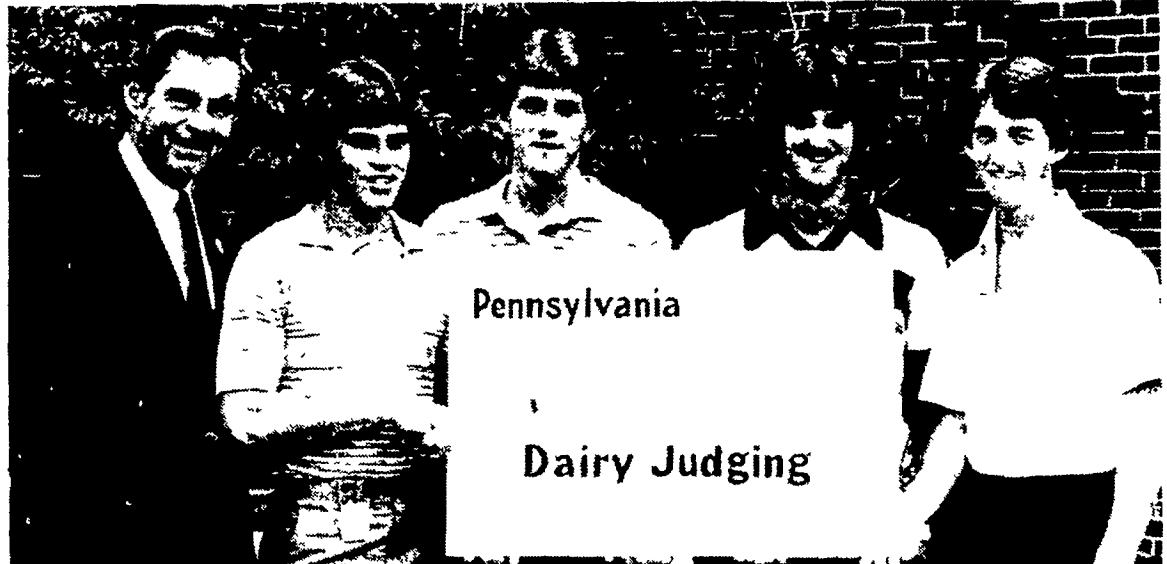
