## Stream protection workshops scheduled

LANCASTER.— The protection of Lancaster County streams will be the topic of three different workshops to be held at the Farm and Home Center, here on September 21, 28 and October 8.

The three sessions are designed to discuss different areas of stream resource and protection programs in Lancaster County.

—The September 21 session will provide an overview of the three presentations and discuss those streams in the county which are designated as high quality streams and why special protection measures are used to keep them this way.

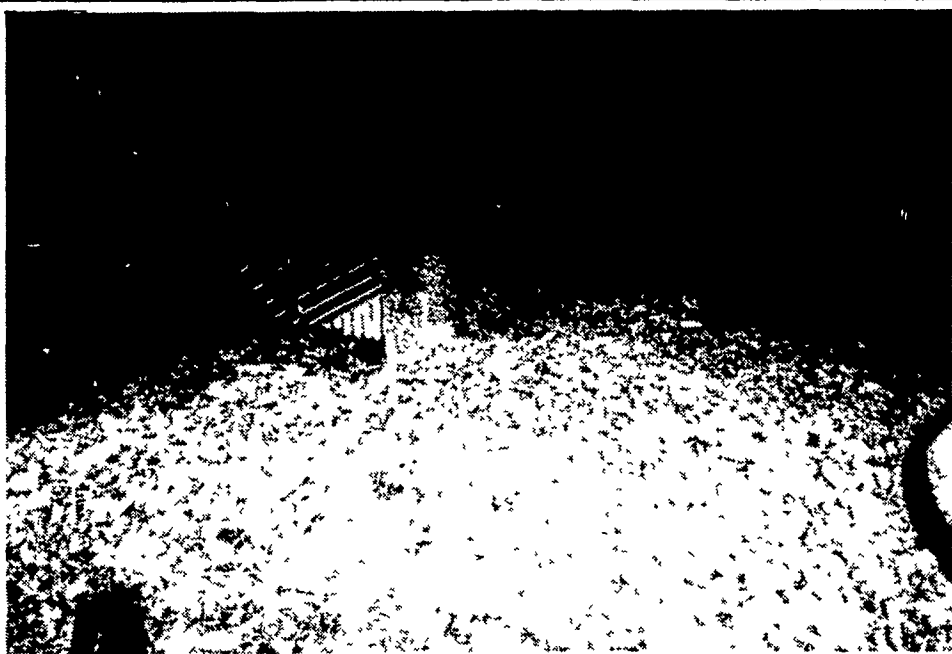
—September 28, this session will discuss the designation of certain

streams as Scenic Rivers. The roles of local, county and state governments in this designation will also be discussed.

—October 8, this session will include presentations by the Planning Commission, Conservation District, and Watershed Associates on their roles in the protection and enhancement streams within the county.

The free sessions are designed for local government officials, educators, farmers, landowners, and other citizens interested in protecting streams.
