LANCASTER - Farm work is often a "round-the-clock" situation. Long hours are a fact of life on our farms. It's always been that way ... and continues to be.


It's true for dairy farmers, poultrymen, horsemen, grain farmers, nurserymen, most anyone involved in a farming pursuit.
