

# The 'Wallaston saga' leads list of many interesting stories

**FARM SHOW COMPLEX** — Many, many interesting stories unfolded at the All-American Junior Dairy Show at Harrisburg on Monday.

Here are highlights of just a few of them:

—For the first time in a number of years, a single exhibitor, 17-year-old Betsy Wallaston, of Toughkenamon, Chester County, captured both the grand and reserve championships in the Jersey competition. And she's following in the footsteps of her older sister, Carolyn, who pulled off the same double win in 1972 and 1973.

—And there were a number of repeat winners. Wendy Yoder, 19, of Shoemakersville, Berks County, won the Milking Shorthorn grand championship for the sixth straight year. For the fourth straight year, Kennard Henley, of Cochranville, Chester County, took the top

Ayshire placing. In 4-H Holstein competition, John Burkett, of East Freedom, Blair County, repeated last year's top placing.

—Incidentally in the Ayrshire competition, it would be easy to confuse the names of the top two winners. While Kennard Henley, of Cochranville, took the grand championship; the reserve grand went to Heather Hernley, of Lebanon (only one letter difference in last names.)

—The State FFA President, Doug Hershberger, of Quarryville, was in the winner's circle with his reserve grand champion Holstein.

—At least one county dairy princess showed and she did it with a broken hand. Cinda Oakes, of Cochranville, Crawford County's Dairy Princess, showed her Holstein calf to the junior FFA championship. Recently, she broke her hand while leading a bred heifer back home.

—The top two awards in the six
