

Penn's Agri-Women convention coming Oct. 13

Hank Milstein of Polaner Products will be on hand to in-

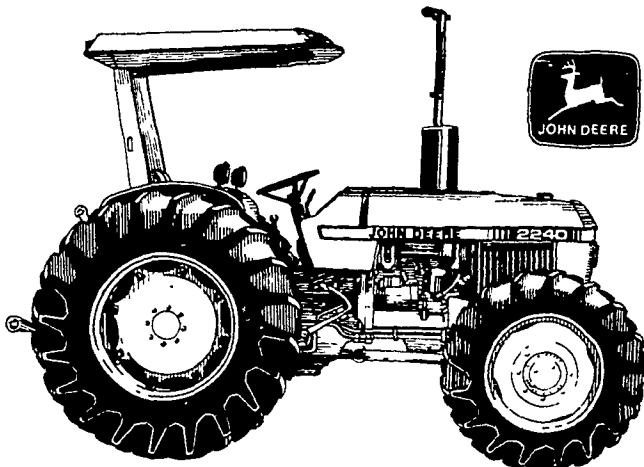
troduce members to an AAW theme song, which they will evaluate for use at state and national level.
