

Reaganomics figures into Manheim beef show

MANHEIM — Reaganomics played a role in the Baby Beef Show at the Manheim Fair Tuesday night.

When the 4-H winner, a 1235-pound roan and white cross out of a Charolais-Angus cow and a Maine-Anjou bull, was pitted against a 1310-pound yellowy-beige behemoth that mixed Charolais with Chuanina, judge Dan Loy, Penn State grad student and coach of the livestock judging team, went to the smaller, stockier animal.

The roan and white was shown by 15-year-old Lori Good, daughter of Paul and Vera Good, 795 W. Lexington Rd., Lititz R6.

The FFA champion animal, the big yellow, was shown by Barry Geib, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Geib, R4, Manheim, who captured his fourth straight FFA title.

"The big yellow animal presents

a problem for me," judge Loy remarked.

"He has the most of everything — frame size and muscle.

"But with interest rates where they are today, these animals are just too big to finish.

"Therefore, I must go to the smaller 4-H animal.

Lori, who got her steer from Carl Herr, of Lampeter, calls him "Benson." (He does have some Angus blood.)

Lori will show him at the County Roundup on November 9 and then must make a decision whether to market him or possibly shrink him for the Farm Show.

Lori is the fourth Good 4-H'er to compete. Her older sister and two brothers preceded her in 4-H, raising their projects on the family's 100-acre hog and steer farm.

"My sister helped me get started two years ago, but this year I was all on my own," Lori explained.

Her previous high finishes were class seconds at county fairs and

the Farm Show. This was her first champion.

"There are going to be a few tears when he finally must go," she added.

Lebanon ASCS seeks committee nominations

LEBANON — Petitions to nominate eligible candidates for Lebanon ASC community committees were mailed to agricultural producers on Thursday, according to John Stuck, chairman of the Lebanon County ASC committee.

The ASC communities in the county are: #1-Heidelberg Twp.; #2-South Lebanon, North Cornwall, West Cornwall, Cornwall Boro.; #3-South Annville & South Londonderry Twps.; #4-North Annville & North Londonderry Twps.; #5-Swatara, North Lebanon Twps.; #6-Union Twp.; #7-Bethel Twp.;

#8-Jackson Twp.; #9-East Hanover Twp.; #10-Millcreek Twp.

A petition signed by three eligible voters is needed to nominate a farmer-candidate. Petitions may be on any sheet of paper and must include a statement that the candidate has agreed to run or a petition may be obtained at the ASCS office.

Nominees should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm and be qualified for committee work. A farmer is eligible if he or she lives in the county and has farming interests in the community. Petitions must be received at the county office, Agway Bldg., 2nd Floor, Lebanon, PA no later than November 2.

The duties of a community committee member are:

To serve as a delegate to the county convention to elect a county committee.

Other duties as assigned by the

COC Chairperson.

The county committee urges agricultural producers to nominate the farmer of their choice to represent them on the ASC community committee.

Broiler placements up

HARRISBURG — Placements of broiler chicks in the Commonwealth during the week ending September 26 were 2,291,000, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

The placements were two percent above the corresponding week a year earlier and slightly above the previous week. Average placements during the past nine weeks were one percent below a year ago.

Placements in the 19 key poultry

producing states were 75,671,000, four percent below the previous week but five percent above the same week a year earlier. Average placements during the past nine weeks were nine percent above a year ago.

Broiler-fryers slaughtered in Pennsylvania under federal inspection during the week ending September 16 totaled 2,187,000, with an average liveweight of 4.11 pounds.
