Joan Cleveland demonstrated the making of teasel animals made with pine cones and dried materials. She also showed grape vine wreath and other dried things.

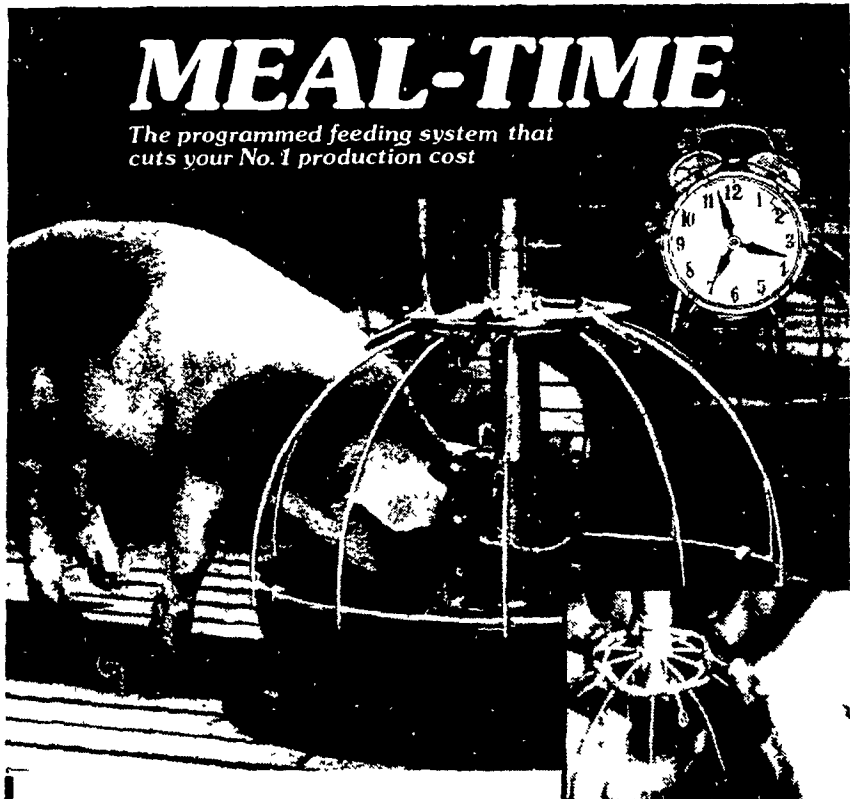
Peggy Lewis was reinstated as a new member.

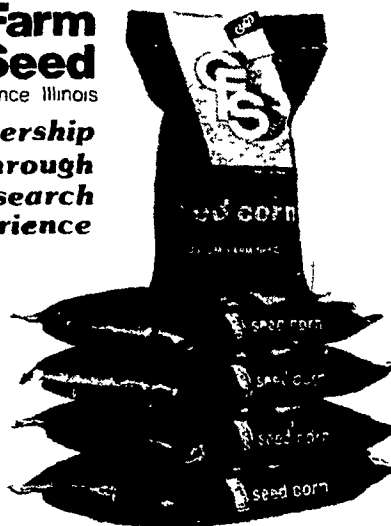
