Kapp, registered with USDA as a dealer to buy and sell livestock in commerce, operates in central New York.

B.H. (Bill) Jones, P&S administrator in Washington, D.C., said the P&S Act requires that livestock dealers and market

agencies furnish a valid bond to secure their livestock obligations. The P&S Act is a fair trade practices law administered by the Packers and Stockyards Administration. It promotes fair and open competition in the marketing of livestock, meat and poultry.
