Elco Young Farmers honor top producers

close to 150 people crowded into the 7th Annual Banquet of the Elco Young Adult Farmers' Association here Thursday evening. Sonnen Acres, a dairy part-

nership from R1 Richland milking 89 head of registered and grade Hoisteins, was recognized for Outstanding Achievement in Dairy Production. Glenn Sonnen and sons Paul and Malcolm had the first place production awards in three

groups: 3-year-old tat, 4-year-old milk, and 4-year-old fat. Malcolm Sonnen was honored individually as Outstanding Young Farmer for 1981 and was recognized for his service to the organization during his term as president for the past two years.

Another dairyman was honored for his Outstanding Achievement in Crop Production at the Thursday evening event. Herman Sauter, Myerstown, turned in the first place samples for corn quality and yield, along with the best haylage sample.

His corn was a long season Pioneer 3184 entry, which he planted on May 10 after con-ventionally preparing his limestone ground. This is the third year of a three-year rotation for his corn. The field, which didn't require liming, received about 450 pounds of 15-15-15 fertilizer plowed down, with an additional 100 pounds of triple-15 in the row. For weed and insect control, Sauter used a combination of Lasso and atrazine and Dyfonate.

Sauter's haylage sample was straight alfalfa of several varieties.

Leon Kline, of Kline Springs Farm, Newmanstown, had the top entry for hay quality. The sample was a combination of three established alfalfa stands from which four cuttings were taken. This top quality hay helps to feed Kline's 50- head herd of registered Holsteins, and keeps them making

Bennetch Brothers, R2 Myerstown, had the first-place 2-yearold fat record, along with the top 3year-old milk record. Willow Maple Farms, Newmanstown, turned in two winning entries -2year-old milk and aged cow milk. And the Raymond Getz family took first place in the aged cow fat category.

Swine producer and Pioneer seed corn salesman Richard Kreider, Lebanon, received the 1981 Honorary Young Farmer Award. And Marlin Getz was honored for his past service as the Elco Young Farmers' vice president.
