Seedmen get exclusive rights to variety production

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued certificates of protection for 19 new seed varieties that give their owners exclusive rights to reproduce the varieties in the United States for 18 years.

Thomas H. Porter, an official with USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said the newly protected varieties are alfalfa, dwarf snap bean, large lima bean, caper spurge, cotton, soybean, common vetch and common wheat.

Porter said certificates of

protection are granted after a review of the breeders' records and their claims that each new variety is novel, uniform and stable.

Among the newly protected varieties are: Hy-phy alfalfa developed by FFR Cooperatives, West Lafayette, Ind.; Lindo garden bean developed by Royal Sluis, Enkhuizen, Holland; the Dompe 95 large lima bean developed by Ben Fish and Son, Crows Landing, Calif., and Chico caper spurge developed by withur A. and Eva M. Henderson, Chico, Seed Co., Inc., Stuttgart, Ark.;

Calıf. The Agronomy & Soils department of Auburn University's Agricultural Experiment Station, Auburn, Ala., received protection certificates for four new varieties of common vetch: Cahaba White, Vantage, Nova II and Vanguard.

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The Plant Variety Protection program is administered by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. It provides marketing protection to developers of new and distinctive seed-reproduced plants ranging from farm crops to flowers.



Fertilizer use hits record high

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Fertilizer Comsumption reached a record high 53.2 million tons during fiscal 1981 that ended June 30. That's up 1 percent from a year earlier and record high for the second straight year.

Increase came despite the fact that the top two users, and 6 of the top 10, used less fertilizer than the year before.

Illinois remained the top fertilizer user, though its total, at 4.26 million tons, was down 5 percent from a year earlier. California remained the No. 2 user though its total, at 4.17 million tons, was down 7 percent from a year earlier.

Iowa held the No. 3 slot with a 4.05 million total that was up 4 percent from a year earlier. Texas moved up to No. 4 with a 2.96 million ton total that was up 5 percent from that of 1980.

Indiana dropped to No. 5 with a 2.72 million ton total that was down percent from a year earlier. Minnesota moved up from No. 7 to No. 6 with a 2.48 million ton total that was up 7 percent from that of 1980
