

Lancaster announces ASC election results

LANCASTER — Farmers recently selected representatives in their respective communities to serve as committeemen for the Lancaster County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service during the ASC elections.

These community committeemen are a vital link with farmers. Their function is to inform farmers about ASCS programs, remind neighbors of signups, referendums, and deadlines, and assist in local problem cases when requested. The length of term for community committeemen is one year.

The community committeemen serve as a delegate to the county convention to select the county committee which serves a three year term. LeRoy H. Pennsylvanians comment on USDA conservation program

HARRISBURG — Nearly 1,200 people in Pennsylvania have mailed their responses on the proposed National Soil and Water Conservation Program outlined by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, reports Graham T. Munkittrick, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

When the review period ends on January 15, the responses will be

summarized and a report prepared for Secretary Block.

SCS has been designated to collect comments in Pennsylvania. The mailing address is Box 985, Federal Square Station, Harrisburg, PA 17108.

While SCS won't begin summarizing the comments until after January 15, Munkittrick noted the responses are coming from all parts of the state.

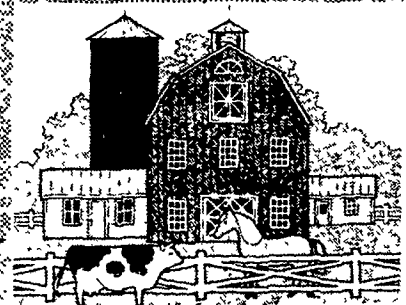
"I'm pleased with the number of responses we have received so far," Munkittrick said, "but I expect and welcome more. It's not too late to comment." During a review of earlier drafts, more than 2,700 people in the State responded.

The main features of the proposed national conservation

program are increased roles for local and state governments in conservation work and targeting a greater portion of USDA dollars and staff to critical soil and water resource problem areas.

The program is the USDA response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). SCS and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state have a supply of the leaflet that summarizes the program and that contains a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form.

The offices also have a reference copy of the full report of the program and draft environmental impact statement.



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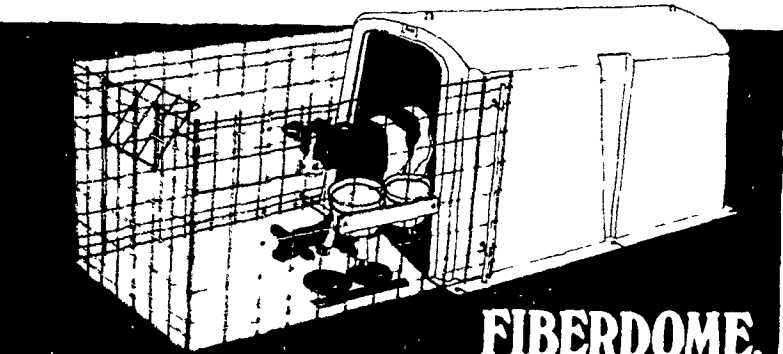
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
