
Toward that end, representatives of the Bureau, an agency of the U.S. Department of the Interior, met on Wednesday with nearly 300 individuals interested in recruiting adopters. establishing and operating the taciltiy.

The main objective of opening this distribution center is to have animals available for adoption by people in the vicinity of the center who cannot travel the greater distance to the next nearest center which is located in Tennessee. This center is currently the only one east of the Mississippi River.

According to Steve Aitman, public information specialist for the BLM, the high number of individuals attending the meeting was not really surprising considering that over 250 people have already requested contracts to till out and submit for consideration.

The purpose of the meeting Wednesday was largely for prospective bidders to ask questions about the requirements for the center, and to compare their current housing situation with the minimum requirements as set by the BLM.

Parties interested in operating the new tacility must be able to provide facilities and services to
