The next evening, Wednesday, Feb. 10, features duck-calling and owl-hooting contests. Lou Hoff-The turkey-calling competition man, editor and publisher of

magazine, has agreed to direct the duck-calling event, while Graybill returns to coordinate the owlhooting.

As in the turkey-calling, contestants will perform a series of four calls from behind a curtain. The judges award prizes to the highest scorer.

Each contestant can register on Wednesday until 6 p.m. The entry fee for both owl-hooting and duckcalling is \$2 for all ages.

carving, opening Saturday, Feb. 6, features a special competition that has become a show favorite. That is the day of the duck decoy painting and head carving contests.




